John Thomson and Edward Stewart were badly scalded last Sunday while working in Mathews' mines, near Cambridge, by the explosion of the boiler used in the mines for pumping. They were about five hundred yards from the entrance and the machinery was left for while, as they were engaged in fixing the pump. Upon starting the engine the boiler exploded, it is thought from low water and heated flues, when the cold water was let in. The physician in charge of the injured men say they are resting easily, although two thirds of the cuticle on Thompson's body is more or less scalded, as he did not inhale any of the steam there are now hopes of his recovery.

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
